# How to Research Universities?


Double diplomas - France- UK

- Use search engines: "Best [subject] programs in Europe"; compare , using rankings + student reviews
- Check:
  - Entry requirements (grade levels, courses studied in high school)
  - Language level needed (Uk universities don't require this for BFI students) (IELTS/TOEFL)
  - Course structure (modules, internships, exams)
  - Campus life, support services
- Make a shortlist of 5–7 programs

### Helpful Tips

- Attend online open days or in person
- Contact admissions offices to ask questions
- Note all deadlines and submit early
- Look for scholarships or EU fee status
- Keep a spreadsheet to track your applications





The average cost of attendance for a student living on campus at an in-state public 4-year institution is **\$27,146 per year or \$108,584 over 4 years**. Out-of-state students pay \$45,708 per year or \$182,832 over 4 years. Private, nonprofit university students pay \$58,628 per year or \$234,512 over 4 years

You might be eligible for financial aid allocated for international students, as well as scholarships, grants, and event private student loans.

#### **Application process:**

- Application forms (with notable exception such as the University of CA system (<u>www.commonapp.org</u>)
- Personal statement/essay
- Teacher letters of recommendation
- Test scores (SAT or ACT)
- School forms
- Transcripts, diplomas
- Supplements
- Academic transcripts (with official English translation)
- Extracurricular résumé or activities list

#### Language requirements:

- Most universities accept the BFI (French International Bac)
   as proof of English level
- If needed, accepted tests are TOEFL IELTS
- Some selective universities may still request a test score if your BFI grades are low in English



#### **Deadlines**

- Regular decision:
  - varies from November to March,
  - but most before January 1st;
  - notification by March 15th
- Early decision/Early action:
  - November 1st to November 15th,
  - notification by Christmas;
  - obligation to accept if financial package meets family needs

## Studying in Canada



Tuition fees for <u>universities</u> vary depending on the program and school you choose. On average in Canada, university tuition costs around:

- \$36,100 per year for international undergraduate students
- \$21,100 per year for international graduate students

On average, living costs are around \$15,000 per year for university students

- University system similar to US
- Easier application process than the US
- Canada is officially French/English bilingual
- Costs can be lower than for studies in the US

#### University system similar to US

- 4 year program to obtain a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree. Equivalence with degrees in the US. In principle, equivalent to French L3, but in practice, no formal recognition.
- Wide choice of subjects over the first two years with specialisation over the last 2 years.
- Large campuses with lots of student residents and lots of organised social activities.

#### **Financial Aid**

- Specific for each university
- Small number of merit scholarships
- Need-based financial aid: usually a combination of scholarship + deferred low-interest student loan and part-time work on the campus.

~36,000 Canadian \$/year (ave) for international students

Advantage for French students in Quebec: Tuition is the same as non-Québecois Canadians, so significantly less than the international student tuition. There are three main English speaking Universities in Montreal: McGill, Concordia and Bishop.

~5,000 Canadian \$/year for French students

#### **University System**

- Bachelor's Degree Awarded in 3 years
  - Ordinary Degree
  - Honours Degree High Academic achievement (exception of Scotland - 4 years for Honours Degree)
- Masters Degree typically 1 year
- Doctorate up to 7 years

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#### **Application system: UCAS**

#### Key steps:

- Choose up to **5 universities/**courses on UCAS
- Write a personal statement
- Predicted Grades for the year terminale
- Reference letter from a teacher from the LFA
- Language level needed (Uk universities don't require this for BFI students) (IELTS/TOEFL non BFI)
- Translated report cards 1ere and Tle

★ Tuition fees: ~£9,250/year for UK students,

~\$22,000 per year, but can vary from \$11,400 - \$38,000 for international students

- **GREAT Scholarships** offer students from certain countries the opportunity for a scholarship towards their tuition fees for a wide range of one-year taught postgraduate courses.

### **Application process**: Apply directly on **www.studielink.nl**

- Choose programs taught in **English** (many are!)
- Prepare motivation letter, transcripts, and possibly an interview/test
- Deadlines: often Jan-April for September entry
  - Tuition fees: ~€2,530/year for EU students
  - Most Bachelor programs last 3 years
